## The Hartley Morris Men

For twenty-six years the Hartley Morris Men have been dancing around the towns and villages of Kent. We were formed in 1952 by the late Percy Sephton who reformed the side from men who had been part of the Stansted Morris Men before the war.

Morris dancing is very old, quite probably pre-Christian. We believe that it originated in the annual fertility rituals that would have been performed, in various forms, all over Europe every spring. Without the technology of his modern day counterpart, the ancient farmer led a very precarious existence, and any means, even magical ones were employed to ensure that a good growing season would ensue.

The dances that we perform originate in the Cotswolds, and it is entirely due to the efforts of the well known folk song collector Cecil Sharp that we are able to dance the Morris today. It was on Boxing Day, 1899 that Sharp chanced to come across a side of Morris dancers in the village of Headington Quarry in Oxfordshire. It happened that the team he saw was one of the last still performing the Morris, and realising that a whole section of folk culture was dying and in danger of being lost forever, he devoted the rest of his life to collecting what he could of the Morris and country dances of England.

Unfortunately for us, nobody thought to write down the dances of Kent, which must have existed in years gone by, because ritual dance is to be found all over the country. In the north-west, clog dances are performed and in the north-east the Morris is danced with swords. In Abbots Bromley in Stafford-shire we find the horn dance and in Cornwall the Padstow Hobby Hoss, all of these are men's ritual dances which were performed every year as part of the regular cycle of life.

Finally, you can help us to keep this ancient tradition alive by dropping a few coins in the hat, the tradition being that this simple act will bring the giver good luck and fertility for the coming year!
