Full details can be found overleaf — but please note that the performances at Farningham on the Saturday evening and Sunday morning are the only ones at which all the dancers will appear together. In addition to the published events, there will be various processions through the village on both days. There will also be a special Morris service at Farningham Parish Church on the Sunday morning which all visitors are invited to attend.

If you want any further information on the Morris in general — or on the Hartley Morris Men in particular—call in at the Pied Bull, ask any Hartley man, or write (with s.a.e. please) to either of the officers of the Club. But, above all, come along and watch the dancing, and be as generous as you can when the collecting box is passed round towards the end of each performance. This allows you, the audience — who are an essential part of the dance — to share in the good luck which the Morris brings, and it will help us to keep up the unique tradition of the English Morris in this most auspicious year of the Double Jubilee.

A DOUBLE JUBILEE!

1977 is not only the Queen's Jubilee year, it is also that of the Hartley Morris Men — which is why we wear the colours red, white and blue and drink Jubilee Ale! We are probably the oldest established Morris side in Kendhaving been formed in 1952 from the tattered remains of the old Stanste team, which in turn originated in the mid-1930's from a folk dance ground in Fairseat.

The dances which we perform have origins which are lost in pre-histor (even in Elizabethan times Morris Dancing was regarded as an old custom. They have their roots in fertility magic, tribal superstition and ritual festivity but from manorial times until the Industrial Revolution the Morris was essertially the villagers' expression of pleasure and awe at the re-birth of Summer and the recurrence of the seasons. And at the great moments of the agricultural cycle out came the Morris Men with Fool, Hobby Horse, and perhaps Betsy, Jack-O-Green, or Cake Bearer, to lead the village revels with the traditional and stylised dances on the village green or outside the village in

We in Hartley, are essentially a village team and we try to preserve the rural atmosphere of the Morris. We have always met for our weekly practice during the Winter months in and around the Hartley area, and during the Summer season we dance whenever possible in the picturesque villages which are to be found in that portion of the Independent Kingdom of Kent which lies between the Darent and the Medway — natural barriers which keep safe from the Ravensbourne Men to the West and the East Kent at Wantsum Men to the East.

Again, whenever possible, we always try to dance outside the villa inn, since dancing engenders a mortal thirst which must be relieved at cost lest dehydration should set in and cause our bells to drop off. And af the day's dancing is over it is our usual custom to move into the final if or an evening or equally traditional music and song.

This year — as usual — the formal start to our dancing year will to place at dawn on May Day, when we help the sun rise over the Coldry Stones at Trottiscliffe. This is quite a spectacle, one of the few at which the extraneous Morris characters mentioned above normally put in an appearance. Having got the sun up, we then make sure it stays around until harvest has been sately gathered in by dancing every Thursday evening — performance on the first of these Thursdays always commencing at Hart Green.

Although we still consider Hartley to be our "home village," our spiritude headquarters are now without doubt at the Pied Bull, Farningham. Our least association with this inn, coupled with our sterling work in trying whene possible to dance only at pubs which serve ale by traditional means, gained us the honour of being the first Morris side ever to receive a mention CAMRA's "Good Beer Guide."

It is in the Bull's fine old coach-house (which was painstakingly restorated to its present state by certain of our members after it had been standing for some 50 years) that we hold our Winter practices, and it is in and are the forecourt that the main event of our dancing year reaches its clim. This is the Annual Weekend of Dance, at which the Hartley Morris Men hosts to more than a hundred visiting Morris Men from teams all of England. This year the event will take place over the weekend June 10/1 and will be bigger and better than usual in order properly to celebrate Double Jubilee.
